The Seventeen Lessons Introduction

One of the great joys in my life has been to teach young adults the fundamentals of the Christian faith. These "fundamentals" are not simply the foundation of one religion called Christianity, but properly understood are the essential basis of all truth and human purpose. I have always shared with students in the first lesson of a communicant's class that the first question and answer of the Westminster Shorter Catechism should be the essence and summary passion of their entire life.

Q. What is the chief end of man?

A. The Chief End of Man is to Glorify God and Enjoy him forever.

All of life is illuminated, informed, directed, and inspired by what God has wonderfully appointed as our purpose. For all those in Christ it is a life and purpose that will never end.

One age group that I love to teach is Middle School. These young adults are at the pivotal time of life that combines wonder and openness with a growing intellect and maturity. It is a golden window of time for establishing the Christian mind and heart. This time we used Stephen Smallman's excellent workbook - *Understanding the Faith*. I wrote lessons around each chapter in the book that explored a combination of questions and answers along with scripture reading, stories, examples, prayer, and catechism question memorization. It would be hard to express how much I was blessed to be part of their lives and explore Christianity together.

The book you are holding is a collection of those 17 lessons. During the class I provided the written lesson to both student and parents after each session. I wanted to create occasions outside of class for reflection and discussion. Within the class we prioritized open discussion as the vehicle for learning. Each meeting was very interactive and participative, which I think we all found to be much more engaging and effective for learning than a traditional classroom where the teacher does the talking and the students take notes. We took the time needed for exploration. In fact, sometimes a single lesson (such as effectual calling) would grow and consume a number of meetings. We started to call the hard but rewarding topics: "Deep Water" discussions. Our minds grew together, and our hearts were inflamed with love for the Gospel and the glorious amazing work of our Savior.

Similarly, in this book, the topic of each lesson is propelled forward through a series of questions and answers. Scriptures, catechism questions, stories, summaries, and prayers fill out the material. My goal is to capture in book form the dynamics of exploration. Accordingly, this book is formatted to facilitate quick recognition of lesson components:

- italic bold font for questions
- *italic normal font for example answers*
- normal font for discussion
- bold font for statements / stories
- light gray hatched shading for scripture references, NIV and for table summary points
- Medium gray shading for *catechism questions* and *answers*.

I want to thank Stephen Smallman who encouraged me to publish this work as a further help to teachers and students who desire to understand the Christian faith. Thanks also to Darlene Frye and Norma Bennett for their editing and suggestions.

Lesson 1 Our Purpose as People

Created for Joy and Glory

Introduction

Who are you? It is an easy question to understand. But a remarkably hard question to answer. Think about it. Try asking someone. They will probably answer the who question with a "what" answer: what their name is, what city they live in, what city they grew up in, what school they attend or company they work for. But "Who are you?" probes much deeper than our what and where answers. It drives us to address our essence and our purpose. Who are you? Do you as a human being have an essential purpose?

The Purpose of Human Life

If you were to ask one or two of your non-Christian friends what they thought was the purpose of living, what would they say?

Most would probably say something like being happy, healthy, wealthy, feeling loved, etc...

WSC 1. What does the Bible say is Man's Purpose?

"To glorify God and enjoy him forever."

What does this mean to you?

That he knows me better than I know myself. That I am made to live for him and that my greatest joy will come when I do that.

The Greatest Commandment	Summary
Matthew 22:36-37 "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" 37 Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind."	It is sin not to love God with all that we are.

How does this change your thoughts about sin?

Most people think of sin as bad behavior or thoughts. Jesus is saying that sin is fundamentally a love problem – not loving God with all that we are. That is what results in sinful behavior.

God's Response to Sin – A Forgiven and Adopted Family

What is God's plan to rescue his creation?

To provide a savior who will rescue a great number of people from sin, and adopt them into God's family.

Would God have been just (right) if He had chosen not to rescue his creation?

Yes.

Why did he do it?

For his pleasure.

Ephesians 1:4-6 For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. The Church

What is this family called?

The Church (called out ones)

The Body of Christ

The Sacraments

The church has a responsibility to administer the ordinances that Christ appointed to benefit his church.

WSC 92. What is a sacrament?

A sacrament is a holy ordinance appointed by Christ, by which, by visible signs, Christ, and the benefits of the new covenant, are represented, sealed and applied to believers.

WSC 93. What are the sacraments of the New Testament?

The sacraments of the New Testament are Baptism and the Lord's Supper, and these take the place of Circumcision and the Passover in the Old Testament.

Who established these sacraments?

Jesus.

Matthew 28:19

Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, 24 and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." 25 In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." 26 For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Who should be baptized?

Anyone, who confesses Jesus Christ, as Savior and Lord should be baptized.

Note – some churches also baptize young children of parents who are confessing Christians. In this case, baptism is not thought of as something that itself secures salvation for the child, but rather is recognition that the child is a member of the church (a parallel to child circumcision in the Old Testament). If the baptized child subsequently makes a confession of Christ, they are then admitted to the Lord's Supper. For more see WSC 95.

How is one able to receive the Lord's Supper?

By confessing Jesus Christ, as Savior and Lord, and usually following baptism.

Who are you? What is your purpose?

"To glorify God and enjoy him forever" (WSC 1)

It is the answer to build your life around and upon.

Review

Lesson 1 - We as people have a purpose from God: To glorify him and enjoy him forever. This purpose brings meaning and direction for all of our life.

<u>Prayer</u>
